The Paramount's Mighty Wurlitzer

The Paramount Theatre was built for showing films. Theatre organs were invented to accompany silent film. The Mighty Wurlitzer theatre pipe organ you will be hearing today is the original instrument featured in the theatre's grand opening on August 29th, 1930.

In the early days of motion picture studios, each studio owned and operated their own theatres as outlets for their motion pictures. Thus, Paramount owned and operated "Paramount Publix" theatres. The Rudolph Wurlitzer Manufacturing Company of North Tonawanda, New York, would often specify that a certain instrument would carry the nomenclature for a specific motion picture outlet.

The Denver Paramount has a "Publix One" (4/21) instrument: Four keyboards (called manuals) and 21 sets of pipes (called ranks) located one- and two-stories above the audience, either side of the theatre, behind the black drapes.

Since an organ pipe always plays at the same volume, heavy wood shutters separate the pipe chambers from the auditorium and they are opened and closed by a pedal shoe on the console. This is one way the organist has to control the organ's volume of sound. The other method is by how many sets of pipes are selected to be used at any given time. The lights in the pipe chambers have been turned on so you may watch the shutters in action.

In addition to pipes, a theatre organ also has tuned percussions – a chrysoglott (like an orchestral celeste) and an upright piano are housed in the Paramount's main (left) chamber. A marimba harp, two xylophones, chimes, glockenspiel and tuned sleigh bells are all in the solo (right) chamber. There are also drums, cymbals, triangle, klaxon horn, fire gong, castanets and two bird whistles All needed for silent film sound effects!

There are two consoles. The one on the left is the main console with all of the organ's controls. The slave console, on the right plays only the pipes the main (master) console has selected. Thus both consoles access and play the same 21 sets of pipes. The only other theatre in the US with original Wurlitzer twin consoles is Radio City Music Hall in New York City.

The characteristic sound of a theatre organ comes from pipes called "Tibia Clausa." The Paramount organ has two sets (or ranks) of Tibias, one in each chamber.
